CACTUS (NOPALITOS)

PICO DE GALLO

Spring Break and Fiesta are over our shoulders and attention turns back to work, classes, STAAR testing, the end of another school year and, for some, graduation.

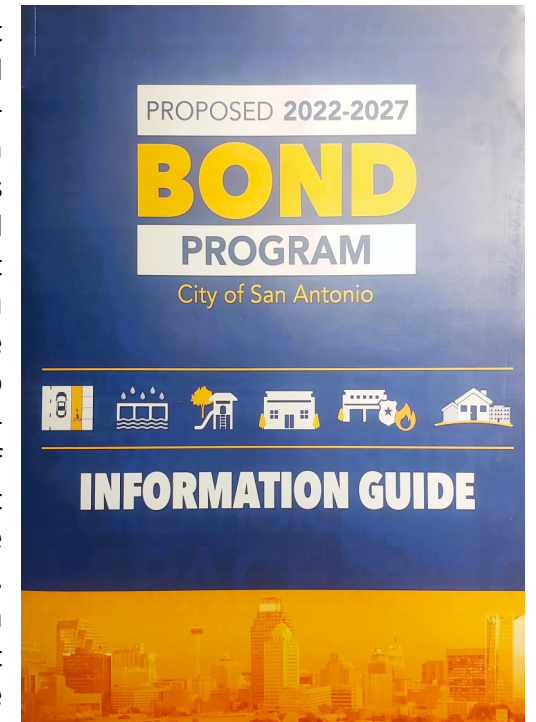

LET YOUR VOICE BE HEARD!

As you all know, the May election is quickly approaching. Last day to register to vote is April 7th, with early voting from April 25th to May 3rd. Election Day is May 7th.

Perhaps the most well known (and most contentious) issue on the ballot this year is the Bond Program. I'm not here to sway you one way or the other, but to keep us all informed. Each of us has the right to vote as we choose. However, I did attend a meeting last month where the City Manager, Erik Walsh briefed on the bond and how it would effect San Antonio.



Big take aways: The proposed bond program is \$1.2 Billion and it is broken down into 6 categories:

- Prop A (Streets, bridges, sidewalks) \$471.6 Million
- Prop B (Drainage & flood control) \$169.9 Million
- Prop C (Parks & recreation) \$271.9 Million
- Prop D (Library & cultural facilities) \$58.4 Million
- Prop E (Public Safety facilities) \$78.3 Million
- Prop F (Affordable Housing) \$150 Million

What is important to know is that the Bond is on the ballot as 6 different votes. Each proposition listed above is a separate vote. For example, you could vote yes on the streets and no on the libraries. When asked, Mr. Walsh said the bond "would not increase our property taxes."
