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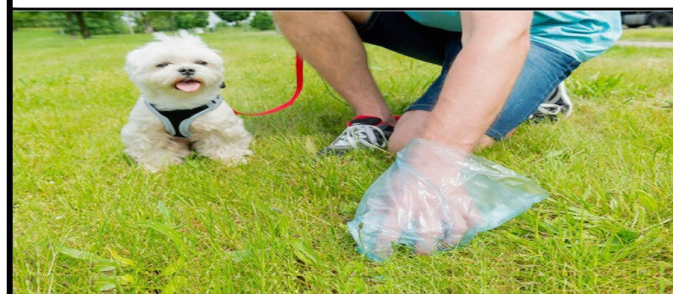

- Planning continues for the annual neighborhood garage sale and National Night Out.

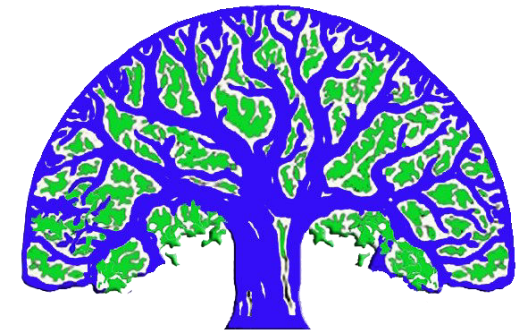

PERIMETER MAINTENANCE/OAK WILT

As an OHPNA property owner I enjoy walking our neighborhood and seeing the common areas. As a perimeter helper in the July 19th clean up, I noticed a lot of tree limbs overgrown and hanging over the fence. If you have the perimeter wall in your backyard, be sure to cut the overhanging tree limbs and bushes away from the wall. This helps minimize damage to the wall and improves access for our mowers.

Experts recommend that Oak trees only be cut or trimmed from July 1st through January 31st. Avoid pruning oak trees between February 1st through June 30th when the Oak Wilt fungus is most active. All cuts and wounds on Oak trees should be painted within 30 mins.

According to City Tree Ordinance, property owners should make sure all overhanging limbs are trimmed 14 feet clearance over the street and 8 feet over the sidewalks, debris is removed, and trees and shrubs are not blocking access to the sidewalks and streets.

CITIZENS ON PATROL COMING TO OHP

Citizens on Patrol (C.O.P.) classes teach neighbors how to be the eyes and ears of the SAPD to assist in reporting crime. To become a C.O.P. requires a 1-time, 4-hr class. Classes have been on hiatus for the summer, but are scheduled to begin again on September 10th, with October's training scheduled for Monday, the 3rd. Training occurs at the Northeast SAPD substation at 13030 Jones-Maltsberger.

All OHPNA board members have either been trained or are currently scheduled for training, with plans to start OHP neighborhood patrols in September. If you'd like to join us, or just want to go to the training to see what it's about, please contact Officer Cathalina Schneider at cathalina.schneider@sanantonio.gov, or by calling 210-207-5182 to sign up. Leave your name and phone number and she'll get back in touch with you. You must bring a photo ID with you when you attend the class.

OHPNA Director-at-Large Adriana Duke recently took the C.O.P. training and this is what she had to say:

"I took the C.O.P. Class with Officer Schneider, followed by a ride along with Officer Lopez on the 4th of July from 10:30 P.M. to 6:30 A.M., informally called the Dog Watch Shift. Officer Lopez took me for a long ride! The vast majority of 9-1-1 calls were do to fire work issues. Dog Watch is more difficult for obvious reasons: House and apartment numbers are not as visible as during the day, so I encourage everyone to have your address numbers properly identifiable. Also, when calling 9-1-1, be precise and clear with your report; when they arrive, collaborate with the police as much as you can; and lastly be considerate and respectful since they are risking their lives for us all. My prayers and blessings are with all of them and especially with Officer Lopez who is a mother, wife, daughter and friend willing to sacrifice so much for all of us. I encourage all of you to take this class which is free and helps our neighborhood to be safer."
